I. AWARD, POSTHUMOUS, OF THE SILVER STAR.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded, posthumously, by the Division Commander to the following named enlisted men:

LAWRENCE J. STRUBLE, 38 565 824, Private First Class, Headquarters Company, 19th Armored Incantny Battalion, 14th Armored Division. For gallantry in action near Steinbach, Germany, on 20 April 1945. When the machine gun platon, of which Private Struble was a member, was clearing the town, one of Private Struble's buddles was killed, attempting to offer covering fire for the rest of the platon. Observing him fall, and knowing that covering fire was necessary for the assault of the pillbox in front of them, he tried to assume his fallen comrade's position, but was killed in the effort. Private Struble's action was an inspiration to all those around him; his gallantry reflects credit on himself and is in keeping with the highest military traditions. Next of kin: Mrs. Selma 0. Struble, (Mother), 737 South 5th, Salina, Kansas.

EARL HOOKS, 34 168 235, Staff Sergeant, Company B, 47th Tank Battalion, 14th Armored Division. For gallantry in action near Germünden, Germany, on 4 April 1945. His able leadership and tactical skill enabled the attack to proceed as planned and end successfully. His aggressiveness, loyalty and able handling of all delicate situations endeared him to the men of the company. When he was killed later, his men knew that they had had a leader worthy of the highest praise. Sergeant Hoeks courage, ability and devotion to duty reflect credit on himself and are in keeping with the highest military traditions. HARRY C. LOCKWOOD, 32 279 471, Sergeant, Company B, 125th Armored Engineer Battalion, lath Armored Division. For gallantry in action near Altenhann, Germany, on 20 April 1945. When the two squads of which he was the leader were pinned down by enemy fire, Sergeant Lockwood ordered their withdrawal. Realizing that his men could not move back unless some diversion was offered to draw the enemy fire away from them he remained behind to deliver the diversionary fire. Dropping behind a depression in the ground, he covered his squads until, after the last man had reached safety, he wa mortally wounded by sniper fire. Sergeant Lockwood's courage, initiative and devotio to duto reflect credit on himself and are in keeping with the highest military traditions. HARRY DEMARSKY, 32 976 809, Corporal, Company A, 19th Armored Infantry Battalion, 14th Armored Division. For heroic achievement near Hatten, France, from 17 to 19 January 1945. Acting on his own initiative, Corporal Demarsky evacuated wounded commades at night while operating an anti-tank gun during the day. Without regard for his own safety, he performed his self-appoint task under intense direct enemy shell fire and small arms fire for three consecutive nights. Corporal Demarsky's unhesitant response to the distress of his commades, courage and devotion to duty reflect credit on himself and the Armed Forces. Entered military service from Brooklyn, New York.

LYNN D. MEIENDY, 36 914 268, Private First Class, Company A, 19th armored Infantr Battalion, 14th armored Division. For heroic achievement near Beilingries, Germany, on 25 pril 1945. Observing a comrade fall under enemy fire, Private Melendy dashed to him to give assistance. Without regard for personal safety, he performed first aid and evacuated the man to safety through intense enemy artillery, mortar and small arms fire. Private Melendy's unhesitant response to the distress of his fellow soldier courage and devotion to duty reflect credit on himself and the armed Forces. Entered military service from Sherwood, Michigan.
